Exercise 1: General Variable Documentation

For each variable below (in bold), read through the tabbed sections of the variable description.

URBAN: From the top dropbox, select "Household" and "Geography: Global," then select the "URBAN" variable.

Read the <i>Description,</i> then click the <i>Comparability</i> tab.

OWNERSHIP: Find the variable in the "Household," "Household Economic" category or alphabetically.
First read the variable description, then select the <i>Universe</i> tab.

EMPSTAT: Find this variable in the "Person" level "Work" category or alphabetically.
First read the variable <i>Description</i> , then select the <i>Comparability</i> tab.
